We will also recognize the following individuals as *Distinguished Members of the 117th Cavalry Regiment*. The position of Distinguished Member of the 117th Cavalry Regiment is designed to recognize former members for their service to the 117th Cavalry Regiment. Their appointment as a Distinguished Member of the Regiment will help to perpetuate the history and traditions of the 117th Cavalry Regiment, thereby enhancing unit moral and esprit. This year selections include the following individuals: MAJ Noel Lyn-Kew, MAJ Joseph McNamara, CPT Ryan Bailey, CPT Vincent Tirri, CSM Edward Santiago, MSG John Rowe, SFC Sam Weiss and SSG Mitch Corrado. They will be honored at our joint meeting of the 117th Cavalry Association and Stable call of the 1-102nd Cavalry on September 13, 2014.

Seventy Years Ago: On 21-22 August 1944, the 102nd Cavalry Group commander COL Cyrus Dolph put the names of his six reconnaissance troop commanders in his hat and pulled out the name of CPT Charles Peterson' thus Troop B of the 102nd Squadron was given the mission to accompany the 2nd French Armored Division on their march to Paris. The remainder of the Group would screen the approach of the 4th Infantry Division. On August 25th, CPT Bill Buenzle Commander of Troop A of the 38th Squadron would lead the Group's advance. As to the claim of who was the first unit to enter Paris, one thing is for certain it was the 102nd Cavalry Group as to what troop both B-102nd and A-38th have laid claim to the honor but one thing is certain Paris was liberated on the 25th of August and the 38th had established its CP in a park off the Champs Elysees while the 102nd was headquartered at Le Bourget Airport. The rest is history.

Operation Dragoon, the allied invasion of Southern France August 15 1944, found the 117th in the lead. A recon troop from the 117th accompanied each of the spearhead divisions (3rd, 45th and the 36th) onto the beach. Throughout August of 1944, the 117th Cavalry would go on to be form the lead element of *Task Force Butler* in the liberation of Sothern France.

A special thank you to *Memories De L'Ain*. It is a French organization that studies the history, heritage and memories of the Department (County) of Ain, France. On behalf of our 117th Cavalry Association, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all the members of Memories De L'Ain. Your re-enactment of the events of World War II helps to tell the story of those who served. In particular your re-enactment of historical events associated with the 70th Anniversary of the Battle of Montrevel/Malafretaz on September 6th and 7th 2014 honors their service and brings to life all the memories of the sacrifices that were made by our veterans of the 117th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron. Your actions have helped to honor their service and perpetuate their memories to all future generations to remember the sacrifices made by those who fought to liberate Europe from tyranny. Your special recognition of their service in liberation of France and in

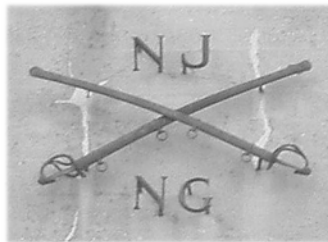

LTC Jeff Brownlee, SCO 1-102nd Cavalry Annual Training at Joint Base McGuire, Dix, Lakehurst was a success for the Squadron. Annual Training began with the Spur ride, this year we had 140 troopers start the Spur ride and 120 successfully completed the event and earned their Spurs. Once the Spur ride was complete, units began mounted and dismounted live fire on a variety of ranges. Our Mortar sections integrated fires with the 112th Field Artillery firing over 500 rounds. A Troop and B Troop successfully completed mounted live fire gunnery tables qualifying over 90 percent of their crews. C Troop conducted a squad level live fire assault on range 47. D Co 250th BSB (FSC) provided outstanding logistical support to the Squadron. During this AT, D Company Maintenance Platoon completed over 60 wheel vehicle services. This will greatly enhance the Squadrons ability to respond to future Domestic Missions, as it is hurricane season. The Squadron Staff conducted an exercise which incorporated a virtual mission with live artillery and mortar fire. As this was my first Annual Training with the Squadron, I was able to assess the training, logistics, and morale of the Squadron. I can honestly say that I am impressed with the level of professionalism and

dedication of all in the Squadron. With the assessment in hand, we now begin to plan and prepare for the training events in Training Year 2015. The Troops of the Squadron will begin preparation for two National Training Center (NTC) OPFOR rotations, D Co will prepare for two maintenance rotations at NTC, and the Squadron Staff will build on the exercise we completed.

I am proud to be the Commander of an outstanding organization and look forward to the challenges ahead.

June 6th 2014 Meeting of the 117th Cavalry Association June 6, 2014 was a special meeting for our 117th Cavalry Association. As most know this year was the 70th anniversary of the D-Day Invasion of Normandy, France and the beginning of the liberation of Europe from Nazi tyranny. It was time to remember the sacrifices and the service of the members of the 102nd Cavalry Group who landed on Omaha Beach 70 years ago as well as their fellow troopers from the 117th CRS who had led the liberation of Rome earlier in the same week 70 years ago.

However, the June 6th meeting was also very special for those present that night especially for the former members of the 5-117th Cavalry who were there that night. It was the memories of fellow troopers; CPT Rick Apblett, CWO Robert Goebel, SP5 Charles Ward and SP5 Leonard Vellucci who died in a tragic training accident while at Annual Training at Ft. Drum NY, 36 years ago on May 24, 1978, that we had come to remember and memorialize, together with members of Cavalry and Aviation community along with members of the Apblett and Vellucci families we placed a plaque inscribed with their names outside the 117th Cavalry Heritage Room, for all who pass by to see and remember the sacrifices made by those members of the 5-117th Cavalry who gave their lives while in the service to their country.

There was a host of memories and stories about all of those told by Colonels Goldstein, Pearce and Harper, CSM Sergeant's Wetzel and 1SG Scannell, Master Sergeant Nier (Medical Platoon Sergeant) and MAJ Jim Scanlon (then a platoon Sergeant) along with CW5 Coymak (then a young trooper), each had special memories to share with us that evening. The formal portion of the meeting was concluded with the recognition of, Carol Pearce, Kerri Pearce Kerr, Robin Pearce Rosler and Leonard T. Vellucci Jr as Honorary Members of the 117th Cavalry Regiment. The over 50 plus troopers and families in attendance adjourned to the heritage room to socialize, remember and honor those who have served and those who continue to serve.

2014 1/102nd Cavalry Spur Ride The "Order of the Spur" is a Cavalry tradition within the United States Army. The Spur Ride is the only means of joining the Order of the Spur, aside from a wartime induction. The Spur Ride is a non-MOS specific event normally held over multiple days during which a Trooper must pass a series of physical and mental tests that evaluate leadership, technical and tactical proficiency, and the ability to operate as part of a team under high levels of stress and fatigue, under both day and night conditions. During the Spur Ride, candidates were required to recite from memory the traditional cavalry poem, *Fiddler's Green*.

This year it occurred over a 72 hour period 9 - 11 June 2014 at annual training. As can be seen in some of the photos on the 117th CAV Association Facebook page – this was a grueling and challenging event which helped bring the squadron closer together and exposed soldiers from all MOS to what the other members of the squadron do to complete the mission.

This is the 5th Spur Ride conducted by the NJARNG CAV. This was the second 1/102nd CAV Spur Ride; the first three were conducted by the 5/117th CAV, also at Fort Dix. The Spur Ride program was brought to the 5/117th CAV by then Captain Hoffstetter while the unit was deployed on the McGuire AFB mission. There are only 6 original 5/117th spur holders still serving in the CAV today. These spur holders include: SGM Ambrose, 1SG Charczenko, 1SG Turner, 1SG Hughes, SFC Burke and SSG Chavez. There are many more currently serving in other units throughout the brigade; LTC Coakley, LTC Hoffstetter, MAJ McNamara, CPT Bailey, 1LT Joe Quigley and SFC Sheila Zelaskowski (1st Female Spur Holder), to name a few.



Each troop from the squadron was responsible for conducting a station covering almost all the major MOSs within squadron. This year, Alpha Troop had station one with a primary focus on mortars and proper reporting; Bravo Troop had station two with a live 25 meter stress fire with assembly and disassembly of different weapons including M-4 and M-240; Charlie Troop had station three with a MOUT based room clearing; HHT had station four which included NBC gas mask full MOPP and COMMO erecting an OE254 antenna; and Delta Company had station five which covered maintenance, vehicle recovery and food service.

We started this event with 143 *Shave Tails*. Soldiers wishing to earn their Silver Spurs are referred to as "Shave Tails". Shave Tail is a reference to when new soldiers would need some time to get used to wielding a saber while riding a horse and units would shave the tail of the horse that the soldier was riding. This let all those riding around him know to stay clear, thus providing the new soldier with some extra space and earning him the nickname "Shave Tail". 118 troopers have completed the Spur Ride, earned their Silver Spurs and are now ready to carry on the Spur Program into the future. This was historic as it is the largest Spur Ride in the history of the NJ CAV and includes three new female spur holders from Delta Company bringing the total to 5.

I have had the privilege and honor to participate in or conduct all of the Spur Rides held here stateside. As some of you may know and understand, this is a major undertaking and does not occur every training year. Right now, we are hoping and planning to conduct the next Spur Ride at the 2016 annual training. The Order of the Spur program allows the CAV to keep its long and storied traditions alive and well.

While the terrain was comfortable and well known, one very important event during this year's AT was designed to test each Soldier's faith and fortitude, the *Spur Ride*. I have to admit that until this year I myself had not yet had the privilege to complete one. I would like to congratulate each and every one of the 120 troopers who completed the grueling test, but especially those 26 troopers from Apache Troop. From a personal perspective, it was interesting to get down and dirty and be able to step away from the responsibilities of Command for the length of the ride and be "one of the Joes". While the Spur Ride was physically and mentally challenging, it reinforced the special esprit de corps that is unique to the Cavalry. While one day I will be forced to move on from the Cavalry, it is events like the Spur Ride that will ensure that I never forget and am always proud of the traditions and heritage that belongs to the 102nd!

1-102d Cavalry Annual Training CPT Ryan Harty B Troop 1-102d Cavalry recently returned from another successful Annual Training iteration at Fort Dix, NJ. Annual Training this year was held from 06-21 JUNE 14. The Squadron is currently in its "Available" year in the five-year ARFORGEN cycle. The ARFORGEN cycle was created to provide some stability during a time of frequent and abrupt deployments to Iraq, Afghanistan, and various other nations. The five-year cycle for the National Guard culminates during the fifth year when the unit is in the deployment window for contingency operations worldwide. Our requirements for "Available" year were to maintain platoon and troop level proficiency along with various other tasks.

During Annual Training, B Troop focused on platoon maneuver. During reconnaissance operations, the platoons are the individual fighting units that are expected to conduct operations semi-independently, often times far from the Troop command post. In addition to platoon maneuver, we continued to hone our skill during gunnery operations. 100% of the B Troop crews successfully passed the stringent Gunnery Table VI qualification. Additionally the troop conducted Advanced Land Navigation training led by our two new platoon leaders, 2LT Dellafave and 2LT Cahill. While it may seem counter-intuitive to have two 2LTs conduct land navigation training, both of these new officers are recent graduates of the Army Reconnaissance Course at Fort Benning. This course conducts extensive training on advance land navigation techniques in addition to the intense and in-depth reconnaissance training that produces subject matter experts in a matter of four weeks.

One of the highlights of Annual Training for many of the Soldiers, to include myself, was the time-honored tradition of the Spur Ride. This three-day event tests in the intestinal fortitude, cavalry skills and combat readiness of cavalry troopers. The successful completion of the Spur Ride earns the troopers their induction into the Order of the Spur and a set of the coveted silver spurs. As always, weather was the primary enemy throughout the spur ride. Incessant rain and heat gave the Spur ride a significant "suck" factor. As the saying goes, "That which is bitter to endure, is sweet to remember". Those B Troopers that went through the rigors and hardships of the Spur Ride will remember it for years to come. This being my last Annual Training exercise with B Troop, I could not have asked for a better way to end my command. It was a great experience to share in the brotherhood of misery with the young Troopers.

As always, the men of B Troop proved their skill and reputation as a combat ready unit, ready to take on challenges anywhere they are needed. As we look to next training year, the Troop stands ready to get back to the

grindstone and prepare for an uncertain world full of challenges and changes. It was an honor to be part of B Troop for the last two years and I have no doubt of their success in the future.

AT-2014 marked an interesting year for HHT 1-102nd Cavalry. Much in the fashion of HHT, the training for the troop during the 15-day operation consisted of an extremely broad span of exercises ranging from tasks such as individual weapons qualification, The Spur Ride, Fire Support and a squadron Staff-Ex. The myriad of exercises were challenging at many levels, however HHT met these challenges, and in the true spirit of the Cavalry, adapted and excelled.

The Spur Ride marked the first major milestone for 28 troopers from the Headquarters Troop. The spur ride was a three-day exercise where troopers conducted tactical road marches to a variety of stations to include: CBRN and Communications, Stress Shoot and Weapons Assembly, Call for Fire, Support Operations, and Military Operations in Urban Terrain (MOUT). For HHT troopers, these stations brought them out of their comfort zones and pushed their limits! Many HHT Troopers became familiarized with Cavalry tasks outside their typical scope of work, which certainly increased overall appreciation for many elements within 1-102nd CAV. In addition, the fact that each of the 15 Spur Ride Teams consisted of personnel from different Troops within 1-102nd CAV, camaraderie and esprit-de-corps was enhanced squadron wide. Finally, the Spur Ride provided the HHT medical section an opportunity to test their skills on numerous injuries ranging from simple blisters to dehydration. Having seen and experienced it first-hand, it was clear that the members of the HHT Medical section are truly masters of their craft, and throughout the Spur Ride and AT-14; medical support for the squadron was truly top-notch!

The HHT fire support section had the opportunity during AT-14 to conduct live fire training with 3-112th FA, and this opportunity was proven highly successful for our Fire Support section. The section completed countless Fire Missions both day and night over a period of 6 days. During this block of training the HHT, Fire support section was able to conduct the first digital fire mission within the 50th IBCT, which is certainly a tribute to their ability and skill! Sadly, our Fire support section will be re-assigned to the 3-112th FA due to an MTOE change in the fall of this year. Best of luck to them on their new assignment!

Finally, The HHT Staff truly tested their abilities during the 1-102nd Cavalry Staff Exercise. The Staff Exercise was a 48-hour operation that allowed each staff section to create and test their systems for efficient and effective battle tracking over the spectrum of each staff function (Personnel Administration, Intelligence, Operations, Logistics and Communications). Collectively, the staff sections all performed extremely well during the exercise, and identified that many of their systems were both effective and operationally sound. The efficiency of the 1-102nd Staff is truly incredible and the type that would provide the 50th Brigade with an operational reconnaissance asset in a forward deployed environment.

Once Again, AT-14 marked an interesting year for HHT, but one that met with great success in a vast range of events. Much in the spirit of the Cavalry, HHT demonstrated once again that while HHT Troopers maintain specialized scopes of work within the squadron, their ability to "Move Out" and "Draw Fire" is certainly in keeping with the finest traditions of our Cavalry heritage!

Delta Company 1-102nd CAV Forward Support Company Annual Training 2014 Fort Dix, NJ Delta Company performed superbly during this year's annual training. Its missions included but were not limited to maintenance functions for all elements of the CAV, ammunition functions, recovery and/or field maintenance of broken down vehicles, refuel operations, and joint field feeding operations. All missions were completed professionally and to standards. All Soldiers of D Company were deployed and redeployed with zero safety incidents.

The production rate of the maintenance control section was outstanding. Over 50 squadron vehicles were serviced during the annual training period, improving overall Squadron readiness. The recovery section performed over 10 successful recoveries during which most vehicles were brought online and returned to the Maintenance Control Point during their own power for further evaluation. D Company command was successful in establishing a Maintenance Control Point at the COL along with a Full Maintenance Control section at the CLTF, which mimicked combat operations.

The Delta Company Ammunition section successfully accounted for and distributed over 145,000 rounds, aiding in range operations. Ammunitions operations were successfully established and carefully managed in order to prevent cross load of live and blanks. All dunnage and deliverables were successfully returned to the ASP. Fueling operations went smoothly including the use of a BDAR (Battle Damage Assessment and Repair Kit) to seal a fuel tank and stop a potential discharge.

The field feeding section prepared and served over 13,000 meals during its critical AT mission. The meals fed over 650 personnel twice daily and were an integral part of the positive morale of the CAV troopers. The operation was conducted jointly with cooks and KPs from the 112th FA. The CKT (Containerized Kitchen) was used to prepare all meals. The cooks received invaluable training on their equipment and were able to maximize cooking times along with ration control. Meals were served on premises along with assets that delivered the meals to LRP's (Logistics Release Points).

Delta Company command was able to identify future training objectives coupled with capabilities of the unit. I am very proud of what Delta Company has accomplished in my first 9 months as Company Commander. The leadership in Delta Company will continue to work hard in order to deliver timely and accurate field services to the 102nd Cavalry.

HAPPENINGS AT THE WESTFIELD ARMORY by Danielle Bracco In January 2014 *Bonds of Courage* moved to the Westfield armory. *Bonds of Courage* was established in 2004. What do we do? **Provide a network of support** to ensure no troop, veteran or family member is ever alone. Our ability to intervene and solve emerging problems makes a substantial difference in the lives of service members. Veterans and those that are still serving, many times, need help being connected to existing programs that are not as simple to access as they should be. **Provide a personalized Career Fitness and Mentoring program** allowing participants a professional assessment, review of career options, job search and networking. We recently expanded this successful program to allow participants to work with a career-appropriate mentor. **Provide care packages and letters creating a connection** with our active duty troops. Due to the growing needs of our veterans, we have expanded this program to provide items to organizations that serve homeless veterans and residents of our local veteran's memorial home.

On Sunday, May 18, 2014 Students, soldiers and others gathered at the Westfield National Guard Armory on Sunday to pack basic items for servicemen and women overseas as part of the Union County "Support 4 Soldiers" campaign. Bonds of Courage, which partnered with the Freeholder board to co-sponsor the event also celebrated its 10-year anniversary at the event. Support 4 Soldiers was created by high school students who have been rallying their classmates, friends, and neighbors to collect toiletries and other basic items for active duty military members overseas. The students were brought together by the countywide UC STEP (Union County Student Training and Enrichment Program) Summit last December. More than two dozen distinctive "Support 4 Soldiers" collection boxes were placed at public buildings throughout the county. On Sunday, May 18, 2014 over 200 care packages were packed by community members and students.

1LT Daniel W. Lee was decorated with the Congressional Medal of Honor...for his actions while serving as A Troop HQ Platoon Leader, 117th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Mecz). During the raging, hours-long pitched battle, Lee organized a small patrol to knock out mortars, which were inflicting heavy casualties. He led the small group to the edge of town, sweeping enemy positions and finding seven Germans operating two large mortars near an enemy half-track. LT Lee armed himself with a rifle and grenades, leaving his men on high ground. He crawled to within 30 yards of the mortars, was discovered and drew heavy fire. His right thigh was shattered. Bleeding and suffering intense pain, he continued the attack, killing 5 enemy

before the remaining fled. Fired upon by an armored car, he took cover by the half-track and found a Panzerfaust, which he used to attack the armored car, which withdrew. Having cleared the area of enemy, he crawled back to his men and collapsed from loss of blood and pain. After the Germans took Montrevel, they left the seriously wounded, 12 in all. Lee was found 2 days later, evacuated and hospitalized. LT Daniel W. Lee returned to the Squadron on 16 January 1945, assigned to Troop C. Lee was leading patrols in February 1944. He was promoted to 1LT on 1 March 1945. (The CMH award ceremony was held at the White House, and presented by President Harry Truman on 23 January 1946). Captain Lee was recalled during the Korean Conflict, stationed at Fort Knox, KY. He and his wife Sallie raised Dan Jr., James and "Beth". He died in January 1985, 65 years old. They were active in the Medal of Honor Society. The CMH Certificate of Daniel Lee is displayed in the Heritage Room, Westfield NJ Armory.
