Squadron Commander's Message The Squadron recently completed our Annual Training at Joint Base McGuire Dix Lakehurst, the last annual training that will focus on our Cavalry tasks prior to our 2019 deployment. As expected the Squadron accomplished all assigned tasks and safely returned to home station. A and B Troops focused on both mounted and dismounted maneuver and successfully qualified all available crews on Table VI for the gunnery portion of the training. Our FSC (D Co) has made great strides and is leading the support elements of the BCT in gunnery qualifying their crews on both the M240 and M2A1 as well as completing Table VI for select crews. HHT managed the CP and the XO led the staff in refining SQDN SOPs and in improving our tracking processes. In addition our Medics provided around the clock support and coordinated for the incorporation of realistic CAS/MEDEVAC training during the training to include several iterations of AEROMEDEVAC with support from the 1-150th (Blackhawk). In preparation for the C Troop deployment to Somalia and to meet mission manning requirements we have

attached a platoon each from A and B Troops to C Troop for their mission. At the beginning of the training period we conducted a change of command ceremony for C Troop. CPT Aaron Tomasini relinquished command and passed the guidon to 1LT London Nagai who will lead C Troop during their deployment to Somalia. London has recently returned from a deployment to the Sinai peninsula, augmenting the 1-181 IN of the 44th IBCT during their MFO rotation. He brings a wealth of recent and relevant experience to the soldiers of C Troop. Our focus in the coming months will be the reception of the approximately 50 soldiers from the 3-112th FA who will join the main body deploying to Jordan. As we continue to refine mission requirements it is imperative that we focus on our personnel readiness and retention. We need every Trooper in our formation to stay healthy and fit for deployment. To that end we are conducting another periodic health assessment (PHA) during our July IDT. This will be the second of three PHAs the Squadron will conduct prior to our deployment. Several of the SQDN staff and myself were able to conduct another site visit to Fort Bliss, TX during the AT period where we were able to observe the Mission Readiness Exercise (MRX) of the 18th CAV (the unit we will relieve when we deploy). In addition the S3 (Operations Officer) from the 1-184 IN (currently on ground in Jordan) was on site to assist with the MRX and provide lessons learned to both the 18th CAV and our team. It is a challenging and dynamic mission that will require our soldiers to work with our Jordanian partners on a daily basis. The OPTEMPO for the SQDN continues to be high as we continue to prepare for our upcoming missions. I appreciate everyone's continued support for the Squadron.

Cup T5, WW II veteran, 15MAR17 98 years old, Emil Allgiere, SFC, USA Ret. Served 27 years, 21NOV17, 78 years old, Clement Curry, SSG, USA Ret. Served 25 years, 3SEP16, 40th Anniversary of the D Troop helicopter crash at Fort Drum, NY, CPT William R. Apblett, CWO Robert E. Goebel, SP5 Charles B. Ward, SP5 Leonard T. Vellucci died on 24 May 1978; Motion was carried to waive reading of 13 April 2018 meeting's minutes, which were accepted; Our Membership Chair, SSG Pedro Martinez reported 20 Lifetime Members (8 current, 8 paid, and 4 pending); (during deployment, past president LTC (Ret)Chris Sands will be handling membership); membership lists are complete; regular dues are \$20/year, Life Member dues are \$400 for under 55 years old, and \$200 for 55 years and older. Next, Treasurer- SFC (Ret.) Bill Gruss reported since last meeting, the starting balance \$6,054.83; Deposits \$200 (Dues) & \$10 (Boosters), and payments, leaving a balance of \$4,990.55 (Heritage Room expense so far \$6,111.11). COL (Ret.) Dennis Dougherty, Historian/Quartermaster, reminded the membership that we are selling hats for \$20, and Association crests for \$25, and Squadron Executive Officer, MAJ Mike Cruz has belt buckles with Squadron Crests \$30, with belt \$50. Frank Mnich gave an update on the progress being made in the Heritage Room: i) the wiring in the ceiling is being updated to meet electrical code requirements, including 3 LED lights, waiting for state electrician, who has volunteered his time and labor; ii) large regimental crest mounted on wall in bar area; iii) guidons have been reorganized. to display appropriately, including current organization in Staff Meeting Area; iv) Nazi flag from WW II being reframed and a citation being prepared, as 1LT Lee's Medal of Honor presentation; v) Armorer, Juan, has initiated a work request to clean outside armory windows; vi) MAJ Harty's father has submitted his estimate for floor replacement, will be discussed at next meeting;, Danielle Bracco, Family Readiness Group, explained that 2 Westfield High School wrestlers undertook a fund raising project, raising \$5,000, of which \$1,000 has been pledged to our Heritage Room, members expressed desire to invite them in the future to give recognition and gratitude. Spur Editor, MAJ Ryan C. Bailey (excused) is in the process of preparing the Summer 2018 edition of The Spur, and is soliciting contributions, with an emphasis on current Squadron members sharing ongoing experiences. Next, New Business: Awards were presented: 1. COL Howard J. Samsel Outstanding Junior Officer of The Year to 2LT Kieran Miller, who enlisted in 2014 and completed training at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, being assigned to D Battery1/40 FA Bn., later completing Officer Candidate School, graduating as part of Class 59, and being commissioned in August, 2016, and was assigned to the 1st Squadron 102nd Cavalry, when CPT Brill reached out for him; 2. 1SG William Maloney Outstanding Trooper of The Year to SSG David Sutton, who enlisted into B Troop, 5th Squadron 117th Cavalry, in 2008, completed his Spur Ride in 2010, and was assigned in 2017 to A Troop, 1st Squadron 102nd Cavalry. LTC Dennis Stiles, 102nd Squadron Commander, shared a story about 2LT Miller. The Squadron was participating in a Command Post Exercise (CPX), where the Tactical Operations Center (TOC) was in a terrible position, where it could not acquire communication with other units. LTC Stiles was concerned and warned his staff that if the situation continues, then they'll have to jump the TOC. 2LT Miller became involved in the communications, and he got the team together and the TOC was jumped in about 6-8 hours. Only later, he found out that 2LT Miller hadn't even completed his basic course at the time. Additionally, LTC Stiles updated the current training for deployment. The deployment comprises two efforts: 1. Troops A, B, and HHT, will deploy to Jordan in support of Operation Spartan Shield, to train their Border Patrol (Jordan has borders with Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Syria and Israel), two battalions at a time with mounted Cavalry Troops, with plus up from 3-112th FA Battalion. They are starting their first Annual Training, comprising gunnery and then phased Mobilization directed tasks, and will have another Annual Training period in January; and 2. C Troop deploying Somalia, within AFRICOM, with a new commander, taking over from CPT Tomassini, who is a Ranger qualified infantry officer, and will be working for 2-113th Infantry Battalion, LTC Karcher, which will have a great reach-back capability. Currently, the Squadron is concentrating on the DMD (Deployment Manning Document), which specifies the manning required to support their respective missions. Their Annual Training, will have C Troop personnel cross-leveled from the Squadron, and METL (Mission Essential Task List) and Mobilization tasks will be trained and validated, and then starting in September they will be following their respective Mobilization Timelines. Next, LTC Hrycak reminded members that elections will be conducted at the next meeting, 14 September 2018. It was determined that no vote was needed to allow the Heritage Room Committee to proceed. LTC Hrycak received a letter from Fred Rodman, from Los Angeles California. He contributed \$50.00 to receive The Spur and donate the rest as a booster, as well as he has artifacts from WWII, to donate to The Heritage Room. His brother, Walter L. Rodman, served in Co. F, 102nd Reconnaissance Squadron, during World War II. LTC Hrycak also introduced his brother, Orest Hrycak, who is Chief Engineer, Product Director Demilitarization, at Program Executive Office (PEO) Ammunition, Picatinny Arsenal, and has worked there since 1989. It was moved by COL (Ret.) Dougherty, seconded by CSM (Ret.) Maggs to Conclude Meeting- 2044 hours.

COL Dougherty described, and shared photographs, of the ships that transported the Squadron to Europe during World War II. This was followed by the Heritage Room Reorganization Committee Co-chair COL Bill Morris gave an update on the progress being made in the Heritage Room: i) the wiring in the ceiling is being updated to meet electrical code requirements; ii) large regimental crest mounted on wall in bar area; iii) guidons have been reorganized, to display appropriately; iv) Nazi flag from WW II being reframed and a citation being prepared; v) Armorer has initiated a work request to clean outside armory windows; vi) 18 month timeframe to change/arrange displays. COL Dougherty reminded members that the 40th Anniversary of the D Troop helicopter crash at Fort Drum, NY, will be on May 24th (CPT William R. Apblett, CWO Robert E. Goebel, SP5 Charles B. Ward, SP5 Leonard T. Vellucci died on May 24, 1978). Spur Editor, MAJ Ryan C. Bailey (excused) had published the Spring 2018 edition of The Spur. Next, New Business: Key speaker, CPT Perfecto Sanchez, who fought in Ramadi assigned to COL Tony Deane's Task Force Congueror (2006) was unable to attend because of conflicting last minute business travel; our second speaker, CSM (Ret) Ernie Stoukas, WWII and Korean War veteran, also had an unexpected conflict and couldn't attend. COL Bill Morris, G3 NJ Army National Guard, explained that our goal is to tie into the current, living and breathing organization, and briefed members on the future deployment of the Squadron. Troops A, B, and HHT, will deploy to Jordan in support of Operation Spartan Shield, to train their Border Patrol (Jordan has borders with Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Syria and Israel), two battalions at a time with mounted Cavalry Troops. C Troop deploying Somalia, within AFRICOM, a failed state with which the United States recently reestablished relations. Their mission will be augmenting their Special Forces (C Troop is dismounted 11B and Scouts). They are commanded by CPT Lacey, who started as a platoon leader in C Troop. Currently, the Squadron is concentrating on the DMD (Deployment Manning Document), which specifies the manning required to support their respective missions. The A and B Troop platoons will be training Mounted Gunnery in April, and STX (Situational Training Exercise) lanes in May, followed by Annual Training, when C Troop will have personnel cross-leveled from the Squadron, and METL (Mission Essential Task List) and Mobilization tasks will be trained and validated, and then starting in September they will be following their respective Mobilization Timelines. Next, LTC Hrycak recalled major change implemented after the reorganized under Division 86, including incorporating the Army Physical Fitness Test and education requirements, and then implementation of the Total Army School System in 1996, when the 254th Regiment was stood up, allowing Reserve Component and Active Component schools to meet the same requirements and train each other, and then 2006, when the Army adjusted to its Counterinsurgency (COIN) mission in Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom. It was determined that no vote was needed to allow the Heritage Room Committee to proceed. Members were reminded to submit stories for The Spur to MAJ Bailey. LTC Hrycak reminded that elections were coming in September. Also, that the next Spurs and Sabers Dance will be at the Grand Summit Hotel on Friday 12 October 2018, and the cost will be increased one dollar. LTC (Ret.) Russia's New Generation Warfare - Lessons Learned - Russo-Ukrainian War

Dr. Phillip A. Karber, of the Potomac Foundation, and LTC Joshua Thibeault, an operations research systems analyst and member of Training and Doctrine Command's Russian New Generation Warfare Study Team, published an interesting article that gives insight into Russia's development and implementation of a New Generation Warfare in Ukraine, in the June, 2016, issue of Army magazine, https://www.ausa.org/articles/russia%E2%80%99s-new-generation-warfare. It is important to study the development of Russia's new weapons and tactics to keep our Army, and our allies, as well as NATO, ready to confront this threat.

There are five component elements: 1. Political Subversion- inserting "agitprop" agents that manipulate mass media through Information Operations using ethnic-linguistic class differences, etc... 2. Proxy Sanctuary – seizing key government facilities, police stations, military depots, and airports, arming and training insurgents who destroy ingress transportation infrastructure, create phony one-party referendums, cyberattacks to compromise victim communications, thereby creating "people's republics" under Russian tutelage, 3. Intervention – deploying large scale Russian forces to engage in large scale military exercises along its border, "introduction of heavy weapons to insurgents; creation of training and logistics camps adjacent to the border; commitment of so-called volunteer combined-arms battalion tactical groups; integration of proxy troops into higher-level formations that are equipped, supported and led by Russians.", 4. Coercive Deterrence – secret strategic force alerts, with "snap checks", forward deployment and exercises of tactical and theater nuclear weapons, aggressive air patrolling in neighboring areas to discourage other state involvement, 5. Negotiated Manipulation – using and abusing Western-negotiated ceasefires to reset and rearm their forces while bleeding opposing army white and using fear of escalation to inhibit other nation involvement and assistance.

Dr. Karber had prepared an in-depth paper "Lessons Learned" from The Russo-Ukrainian War – Personal Observations' 6 July 2015 for a Historical Lessons Learned Workshop sponsored by Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Laboratory and U.S. Army Capabilities Center (ARCIC) based upon 15 separate trips to Ukraine from March, 2014, through June, 2015 (when he was wounded during an MLRS (Multiple Launch Rocket System) attack at Lebedyns'ky and had to discontinue his trips). Unfortunately never published (I have an electronic copy to share), it urged a military dialogue to observe and understand the Russian "New Generation Warfare" as it was being implemented in eastern Ukraine, the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the Minsk I and II Ceasefires, assess the current and future capabilities of the Ukrainian Army, most importantly to create an understanding and develop capabilities for U.S. and NATO forces to counter, neutralize, and defeat the Russian Warfare by gaining an insight and understanding into its Tactics, Techniques and Procedures (TTP's).

I can only share a few examples of Dr. Karber and LTC Thibeault's observations and recommendations. Electronic Warfare is the centerpiece of the Russian effort, to deny communications (there are areas in the Donbas region where no electromagnetic communications are possible), defeat Unmanned Aerial Systems (which are relied upon to a very large extent not just for reconnaissance and surveillance, but also targeting and even bombing), defeating artillery and mortars, and targeting command and control nodes. They urge our forces to go back to being proficient on analog systems, remove all unnecessary electromagnetic emitters, and "a day without radios and computers" during training missions, as well as develop organic Electronic Warfare (EW) systems. Unmanned Aerial Systems are being used in large numbers on both sides, with their limited radar cross-section and ability to appear on target with little to no warning, they have been used very effectively for immediate and mass suppression or mechanized and light units, citing one battle in July, 2014, where two Ukrainian mechanized battalions suffered mass casualties (over 30%) in minutes (together with massed artillery, rockets, top-attack munitions and thermobaric rounds). New weapons are being employed to defeat UAV's, but need to be deployed down to company and platoon level. Our forces need to emphasize cover concealment, and deception (yes, just like the Cold War), in addition to using these new UAV defeating weapons and tactics.

Of grave and immediate note: "Russia employs a combination of dual-purpose improved conventional munitions, scatterable mines, top-attack munitions and thermobaric warheads that have catastrophic consequences when used in preplanned, massed fire strikes. The U.S. has removed all of these warheads from its inventory." (Army article) This would require U.S., NATO, and allied development and intervention (including the repeal of Secretary of Defense Gates directive for U.S. forces to comply with the 2008 Ottawa Treaty) to reverse the sliding-back to the dark ages nature of Russian development of weapons and ammunition that a decade ago all major powers agreed was a relic of the Cold War and needed to be demilitarized and relegated to museums.

As a final example, in early August, 2014, Ukrainian Colonel Mikhail Zubrowski(presently LTG), a Fort Leavenworth Command and General Staff College graduate, organized his 95th Air Assault Brigade, and planned and executed the "largest and longest armored raid behind military lines in recorded military history" (Dr. Karber, Lessons Learned, pg. 35), modeled after JEB Stuart's raid of the rear of McClellan's forces during the Civil War Penninsula Campaign, by employing combined-arms company teams along parallel axes of advance, penetrating the enemy's defenses, splitting the two People's Republics in half, and then clearing out 200 Kilometers of the infiltration area along the southern Donbas, including relieving the beleaguered 25th Airborne Brigade, overrunning and capturing and destroying Russian tanks and artillery, and finally returning to the starting area near Sloviansk (moving and unprecedented 450 Km, mostly behind enemy lines). This demoralized the Russian and proxy forces, but relieved several trapped Ukrainian garrisons. Unfortunately, this spurred a heavy-handed counterattack by Russian Battalion Tactical Groups toward the end of August, 2014, resulting in the Battle of Ilovaisk, and creation of a new Western Front toward Mariupol (to attempt a land bridge to Crimea). The Ukrainian forces were in a large part surrounded, and massed fires decimated two mechanized battalions in a matter of

minutes, giving Putin a chance to force Ukraine's President Poroshenko to accept the first Minsk ceasefire agreement, which included the right of safe passage, which the Russian, and proxy, forces reneged on, massing fires and killing retreating Ukrainians, and capturing and torturing Prisoners of War (POW).

Thus, we have the harbinger of Russian-developed New Generation Warfare being employed and developed in eastern Ukraine. Although the media has ignored the Russo-Ukrainian War, the military has not, and cannot. U.S. and other armies have been training and preparing Ukrainian forces to continue to fight and counter the Russian invasion. But it is up to us, both those currently serving, as well as those that are now retired as spectators, to keep our leadership sighted in to what really matters. Russia has already showed the world what it can and will do in Chechnya and Georgia, and currently Syria as well, and our country's leadership needs to study and develop our fighting forces to counter and defeat them, and all those who want to follow them. -Contributed by Our President LTC(Ret.)Michael Hrycak


